The home of Isham and Malinda Morton Saling is an unusual and important Oregon example of the Italian Villa style. Belvedered structures were never common, and brick structures of this period are practically unknown.

The Saling House, a fine brick home, was a long-term historic preservation project of the Umatilla County Pioneer Association. The empty house was purchased in 1976 by the committee for restoration with money raised throughout the community and matching grants from the State Parks Division and the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Oregon.

The house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Initial restoration efforts have focused on repairing the house's exterior to protect its interior from weather damage.


The building was designated as one of the state's most endangered buildings by the former Historic Preservation League of Oregon (now Restore Oregon) in 2014.

The Umatilla County Pioneer Association transferred the property to WADA by Quit Claim Deed in April 2024.

The Isham Saling House Restoration Committee now functions under the nonprofit umbrella of WADA.

Weston Area Development Association was founded in February 2022 as a private, non-profit organization. We are dedicated to the preservation of Weston's historic resources through education, promotion and advocacy.

WADA was organized as a nonprofit to encourage restoration and revitalization in downtown Weston and the general area that results in economic development and a positive sense of community. We have a vision to preserve and enhance the historic charm and uniqueness of the history of Weston.

To help reflect our diversity the WADA Board considers geographic representation, and cultural background when appointing advisors. In addition, the organization seeks balance among the professional groups encompassed by historic preservation.

Te promote communication in support of historic preservation in the Weston area and developing a network of preservation supporters.

WADA educates and informs the public through a monthly newsletter, workshops, and other means.



We monitor and support legislation to promote historic preservation in Weston, Oregon, and the United States.

WADA serves as a liaison between local, statewide

and national historic preservation groups.

We assist with historic preservation projects in the Weston area. WADA is a designated *Connected Communities* within the Oregon Main Street Revitalization Program. These grants are designated for Weston's Historic Commercial Downtown District along Main Street. The grant cycle is open every two years.

WADA is working towards stablishing an endowment fund to financially support future historic preservation work in Weston. We recognize that deferred maintenance is the biggest cause of deterioration of our historic buildings. Restoration and repair is just the start. We must keep up on the maintenance. We also understand that grants are not always available for historic preservation. Having our own resource will help WADA work with local historic property owners.



WADA's overhead depends on donations which is separate from donations towards our projects. Donations not designated towards a project or property help support our operation which includes publishing our monthly newsletter and more.

The organization is governed by a Board of Directors. There are seven standing committees: Membership, Fund Raising, Partnership Outreach, Public Relations, Education, Conservation Easements, and Legislation. In addition a Board of Advisors assists our board with our work providing advice and other input where needed.

The Weston Area Development Associa-

tion will work cooperatively with local, state, and federal government resources as well as other organizations and individuals. We hope that you

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will join us in pit endeavor.
