Building Conditions Survey Needed for Downtown Historic Buildings

The next step for Weston Area Development Association (WADA) is to have an *Architectural Survey and Analysis* completed on each historic building within the Historic Weston Commercial District. This is an important document to have for future grant applications.

While it is not currently required on all grant applications, we understand that when one funder is requesting it, it is no doubt a signal that other funders will begin asking for this, especially when the grant requests are large amounts.



WADA had the assistance of Shannon Sardell, Historic Architect from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, with the recent 2025-2027 Oregon Main Street Revitalization grant application. We needed a couple of buildings reviewed for the grant. Ms. Sardell was willing to come to Weston to help us and ended up walking through downtown taking notes and photographs.

She proposed such a report that will include the onsite architectural survey and analysis of 13 historic buildings located within the Weston Historic District in Weston. These surveys will include visual and pictorial inspection of the building.

The architect will follow up with a report discussing each building, propose historic preservation projects and rank them from critical to high then medium and low priority. The report often discusses volunteer projects and ongoing maintenance that can help the building envelope perform better.

The onsite survey work is estimated to take 3 full days. The estimate is based on 13 resources spending approximately 2 hours of onsite

2025-2027 Oregon Main Street Revitalization Application Submitted

WADA submitted their application for the 2025-2027 grant on behalf of four buildings.

The group originally had planned to submit only three buildings but at the last minute an issue was discovered with one of the buildings downtown that needed attention sooner, than later.

If the grant is fully funded it will cover restoration and repair of the Long Branch Café & Saloon (Saling & Reese), City Hall (Farmers Bank), Central Station (Polly's Antiques), and the Reynaud Building.

The grant was submitted for projects amounting to \$377,000. Each property owner must cover 30% match for their projects.

Awards are announced around June 1, 2025 with final reports due February 1, 2028. WADA has two years to complete the projects.

per building. This would include time to walk through, photograph and take notes or measurements of important features or concerns.

The follow up report for each building is proposed to take 10 hours. The final product of work would in-

clude a list of recommendations and suggestions for future preservation work in the Weston Historic District.

This project will include all of the historic buildings in downtown Weston. WADA will be asking each property owner for permission to



have their building surveyed. The final report will be shared with each owner so that they have a report for their records.

This project is vitally important for future grant applications. It will support requests for funding based on need. It will show the condition of the building along with photographs to prove our request for funds. By having this study done at one time, it will save money over having to have someone come in specifically to conduct the study on

each building.



Case in point: WADA has contracted with Crow/Clay Architects to do a similar report update for the Isham Saling House. The cost is \$6,129.00. That is just an update of the report. To start a survey from scratch would cost more. We have the grant funds and donations to cover this project.

Future grant proposals for projects that WADA will be

applying for grants will require a copy of the building analysis. It will make our work much easier knowing ahead of time what the condition of the building is so that we can properly document the need for the funds. The report will assist engineers and architects if they are needed for the project.

We hope to cover the costs with grant funds and donations so that the property owners will not have to help pay for the project. The total cost for 13 buildings is \$28,588.78

Recent Oregon Properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places

Juniper House in Portland, Multnomah County, listed in February 2025. Originally constructed as a



single-family residence in 1902, Juniper House cofounders John Trevitts, Doug Foland, and Jan Weyeneth converted the

building into Oregon's first HIV/AIDS end-of-life care home in 1987. From May 1987 to September 1989, Juniper House filled a critical void in Oregon's healthcare system during a period marked by widespread stigma and systemic discrimination of people with HIV/AIDS. The care facility offered medical care as well as emotional support and a sense of peace, community, and normalcy for residents. Advocacy and education were also integral components of the mission of Juniper House; during its operation, press and local news outlets were invited to the house, leading to newspaper articles and documentary features on KGW-TV and Oregon Public Broadcasting that reached broad audiences in the late 1980s. Juniper House's influence was crucial in shaping public opinion and responses to HIV/AIDS in Oregon, and it inspired the establishment of several similar end-of-life care facilities around the state in the late 1980s and after. View the nomination.

Burkes-Belluschi House in Portland, Multnomah County, listed in February 2025. Situated on a hillside in northwest Portland's Westover Terrace



subdivision, the Burkes-Belluschi House was designed by Pietro Belluschi for Dr. D. C. Burkes and his wife Genevieve in 1944; due to World War II

shortages, construction was not completed until 1948. In designing the house Belluschi worked closely with the Burkes, who admired modernist architecture and the International Style in particular. As one of the leaders in developing the Northwest Regional Style, Belluschi was sensitive to the house's siting as well as its materials. The result was a house with expansive city views, deep eaves, woven wood ceilings, and stone fireplaces. This is Belluschi's only residential design in western Oregon to display elements of both the International and Northwest Regional styles of architecture. After retiring as dean of M.I.T.'s School of Architecture and Planning in 1965, Pietro Belluschi and his wife Marjorie purchased the house from Genevieve Burkes and made it their last personal residence. View the nomination.

Dr. Edward and Anne McLean House in West Linn, Clackamas County, listed in January 2025. Located on the southern bank of the Willamette Riv-



er in West Linn's Bolton Neighborhood, the McLean House was designed and constructed by the Henderson-Bankus Company for Dr. Edward and Anne McLean

in 1927. The house exhibits a modified or eclectic Colonial Revival style with its symmetrical sidegabled form, original multilight wood windows, entry portico, and English Cottage-style rolled-edge roof. While notable for its architectural merit, the McLean House is also significant for its association with the Physicians' Association of Clackamas County (PACC), a very early Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) using the prepaid medical care foundation model. Dr. Edward McLean, working from his home office, collaborated with Dr. William O. Steele, and Dr. John ("Jack") G. P. Cleland to develop the organization between 1932 and 1938, in the depths of the Great Depression. Their mission was to provide health care coverage that was high quality, affordable, and designed to fit the needs of area residents—many of them millworkers and their families. The PACC was unique for its time, and it has since proved to be a national model for improving health care delivery. View the nomination.

Lee-Janouch House in Medford, Jackson County, listed in January 2025. The Lee-Janouch House is significant as an excellent—and unusual—example

of the National Park Service Rustic or Cascadian style in a private residential



application. The house was constructed in 1934 by Isaac

"Ike" Davidson, the building superintendent of Crater Lake National Park, for Medford residents Dr. Robert and Dema Lee. Davidson sourced stone for the house's distinctive masonry façade from Crater Lake National Park and engaged National Park Service personnel, techniques, and equipment in its construction. He later pled guilty to misuse of federal funding and served as the primary witness in a related case against his supervisor; both men were terminated from the Park Service and served prison time as a result. As a result of its connection with Crater Lake National Park, the materials and design of the Lee-Janouch House echo the Rustic or Cascadian style associated with the Park Service. The building features battered stone walls con-

structed of located sourced masonry, redwood board-and-batten siding in the gable ends, and simple interior finishes. View the nomination.

The National Register is maintained by the National Park Service under the authority of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. Properties listed in the National Register are:

- Recognized as significant to the nation, state, or community;
- Considered in the planning of federal or federally-assisted projects:
- Eligible for federal tax benefits;
- Qualify for historic preservation grants when funds are available;
- Eligible for leniency in meeting certain building code requirements; Subject to local laws pertaining to the conservation and protection of historic resources.

State law in Oregon requires local governments to offer a minimal level of protection for properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places: the decisions about how to accomplish that goal reside with local governments, which also have the authority to create and regulate local historic districts and landmarks.






Club Has Delightful Afternoon



Northwest Digital Heritage Reaches One Million Digital Records

People around Oregon and the world now have free access to search over one million digitized photographs, letters, documents, and more from around the Pacific Northwest. These historic and cultural materials are available in Northwest Digital Heritage, a website that searches the collections of over 300 regional libraries, museums, and cultural heritage organizations.

Northwest Digital Heritage is an online search portal that gathers records from the online collections of libraries, museums, universities, historical societies, and other organizations in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The site was created in 2021 through a partnership between the Oregon Heritage Commission, State Library of Oregon, and Washington State Library.

Items available through Northwest Digital Heritage span topics, from <u>football</u> and <u>women's suffrage</u> to <u>Tribal treaties</u>, <u>Black history and culture</u>, <u>Crater Lake</u>, and much more. The content has proven valuable to educators and students doing classroom projects, genealogists researching family connections, scholarly researchers, historians, cultural heritage organizations making exhibits, and other lifelong learners.

The over one million materials include over 60,000 photos from Oregon State Archives' <u>Oregon Scenic Images Collection</u>, 20,000 items from the <u>Oregon Historical Society Research Library</u>, 5,000 records from the <u>Harney County Library</u>, 13,000 images from the <u>Salem Public Library</u>, and nearly 2,000 materials from the <u>Five Oaks Museum</u> in Washington County.

The collections in Northwest Digital Heritage are also included in the <u>Digital Public Library of America</u> (DPLA), which helps bring this unique and local Northwest content to a national audience. More than 5,000 institutions throughout the nation have contributed over 50 million records to the DPLA to date.

"Being able to search one million records for primary sources documenting the human experience in the Pacific Northwest is an incredible opportunity for those interested in history," says Katie Henry, Oregon Heritage Commission Coordinator. "The three Northwest Digital Heritage partners know these are only a fraction of cultural materials held by hundreds of organizations across Oregon, Washington, and Idaho. We look forward to working with existing and new partners to continue growing this

incredible resource."

In addition to helping make this resource available, the Oregon Heritage Commission, State Library of Oregon, and Washington State Library assist heritage organizations across the Pacific Northwest. Such assistance includes:

- Training, resources, information, and guidance on digitizing and making collections accessible online:
- Grants and funding opportunities; and Hosting organizations' online collections.



Be sure to check filters every month to ensure proper airflow. For ductless pumps, clean the filter on the indoor fan -coil unit monthly to guarantee maximum efficiency. If you have a ducted HVAC system, replacement filters are recommended every one to six months depending on use.

- **Keep your equipment free of clutter.** While inspecting filters, check that furniture or other obstructions aren't blocking your equipment. To increase airflow, maintain a two-foot clearance area around any openings. Outdoor systems can be managed by removing any encroaching plants on your heat pump or air conditioner.
- Insulate hot water pipes. Uninsulated hot water pipes often make your water heater work harder than necessary to maintain the set water temperature. Insulating your hot water pipes reduces heat loss, giving your water heater a break and allowing you to save money on utility costs.

Replace old light bulbs with energy-efficient LEDs. LED bulbs are energy-efficient, saving money and energy. The average U.S. household has around 50 light bulbs, so that undertaking might sound difficult, but a good place to start is by replacing your five most-used bulbs with <u>ENERGY STAR® LEDs</u>.

• Take advantage of the sunshine. Opening curtains and blinds to let in natural light will help your home feel warmer during those cool spring days. To keep your house fresh and comfortable, clean your windows of dust, dirt and grime.

Be smart with your heating. It may seem obvious, but turning the heat down is an easy-to-overlook

step that can have a significant impact on energy costs. Setting back the thermostat in empty units or unused rooms is a great place to start, but a more efficient option is to install <u>smart thermostats</u>.

The America 250 Oregon Commission is excited to announce the launch of Oregon's official U.S. Semiquincentennial website, oregon250.org. In this digital space, the public can browse a community events calendar, explore online exhibitions, and access resources for getting involved in this nationwide commemoration. The site also includes links to all nine of Oregon's federally recognized tribes. The America 250 Oregon Commission was created by Senate Bill 1531, signed into law on March 27, 2024, by Governor Tina Kotek. Chaired by the Oregon Historical Society's executive director, Kerry Tymchuk, the 27-member commission has been tasked to coordinate and provide guidance for Oregon's official observance of the United States Semiguincentennial. To date, the commission has met three times and has developed its mission and guideposts.

The mission of the America 250 Oregon Commission is "to coordinate, provide guidance, and ensure that Oregon's official observance of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States is inclusive and shares the histories of Oregon's diverse populations, including the histories of the Indigenous peoples who have resided here since time immemorial."

The commission's official guideposts are:

- To inspire Oregonians to participate in the work of forming a more perfect union.
- To highlight the importance of civics and history education in building a better future.
- To highlight the work of Oregon's many history and heritage organizations.
- To celebrate the unique traditions, arts, and cultures of communities throughout Oregon.
- To honor the service and sacrifice made by Oregon's veterans.

While guidelines for community event submissions are currently in development, the America 250 Oregon Commission encourages the public to explore two online exhibitions created in honor of the U.S. Semiquincentennial.
